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
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YMCA/Library Progress

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
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CELL TOWER FOLLIES

Sharon Abel & Christine Brunt Concerned Citizens of Laurelwood

In late January a handful of residential property owners in the vicinity of Old Oak Drive received a simple notification from WIND Mobile declaring their intention to erect a 30 metre telecommunications tower at 516 Erbsville Rd. Existing regulations only require WIND to inform property owners within a meagre 90 meter radius of the installation.

Knowing that very few Laurelwood residents would ever become aware of the construction of this tower until it was up, one property owner delivered copies of the original notification to various homes in the area. The impact of the proposed structure in such close proximity to our 3 schools (St. Nicholas, SJAM and Abraham Erb), 2 daycare centres, a senior's home and our residences, brought 5 Laurelwood families together to try to protect not only our neighbourhood but any residential area populated by families and schools.

Awareness was the main goal of this small group of concerned citizens, so flyers were posted on mailboxes with contact information. Submissions to the federal and municipal governments were made and different media were contacted. Within 5 days, 500 petition signatures were

collected and shortly afterward presented to Mayor Brenda Halloran.

With the highly commendable support of M.P. Peter Braid, a meeting was arranged at City Hall attended by Mr. Braid, the Mayor, Councillor Karen Scian, City staff and representatives from both WIND Mobile and Industry Canada, to clarify the roles of all the parties involved. At the conclusion of this meeting, WIND Mobile agreed to consider alternate sites.

During this time, it came to light that Rogers had previously erected a 29mhigh cell tower in the parking lot of the Laurelwood Commons plaza in September 2010 without filing an application with the City of Waterloo. The choice of 29m (rather than 30m) made the tower exempt from any municipal review, public consultation or process. All that was required was to make an application. In March 2011, six months after the structure was erected, Rogers filed their application which was then accepted by the City of Waterloo. Oddly, SJAM within a stone's throw of the new tower, is considered "institutional" and thus, exempt from needing city permission. The nearby homes are on "mixed use land" and so are similarly unprotected.

The results of research on health effects are mixed. Wisely, some municipalities and school boards have decided to err on the side of caution and have policies to keep cell towers a safe distance (300-500m) from residences, schools, hospitals, etc., due to concerns about health, devalued properties and aesthetics. Unconscionably, Industry Canada, the federal regulator, deems engineering alone to be the compelling issue when considering the propriety of situating a tower.

WIND Mobile is currently looking into co-locating on the CBC tower (a great option in our opinion) or with the Rogers tower at Laurelwood Commons Plaza (too close to schools and homes). Bell and Telus have erected portable cell towers on Hydro land near the YMCA/Library, indicating that better options for citizens exist.

As of May 1st, there has been no final decision on the WIND Mobile tower placement. In the case of an impasse, Industry Canada will have the final say.

CITY COUNCILLOR UPDATES

City Councillor Karen Scian provides the following updates on issues of Laurelwood concern.

CELL TOWER ISSUE

The cell tower issue is still unresolved. WIND Mobile has applied to assess the CBC tower (that we see in the western horizon) for suitability. As there are no pockets of industrial land in the northwest corner of Waterloo, their challenge becomes locating their equipment in spots that provide effective cell coverage for their customers.

The City of Waterloo is NOT interested in allowing cellular towers in residential neighbourhoods and is assisting WIND Mobile in their extensive efforts to find a better answer to this puzzle. The City is also dealing with the cellular tower on the Laurelwood Commons, which Rogers installed in the fall of 2010 without following City of Waterloo procedures of application and notification. This story is still evolving – stay tuned.

SPEED BUMPS RETURN

The Willow Wood speed cushions will be reinstalled shortly. These devices have been very successful in controlling traffic along this strip of residential road – average speeds have dropped by over 15kph! The pilot program has been so successful

that other parts of the city have been trying to "relocate" our speed cushions. They have proven to be an inexpensive and




effective way to calm traffic.

The City will be installing permanent versions on Willow Wood this year and will be launching a comprehensive plan to applying this program across Waterloo. These speed cushions were specially designed to accommodate our Waterloo fire trucks – allowing for effective traffic calming, but maintaining mandated emergency response times.

COLUMBIA STREET IMPROVEMENTS

Columbia Street (Fischer-Hallman to Erbsville Rd) will be reconstructed and the public input sessions continue. Choices need to be made regarding intersection treatments, numbers of lanes and accommodating alternative transportation (bike lanes,



multi-use trails, etc). As a result of the engineering challenges of dealing with "the dip" in the road, this is the most expensive road in Waterloo – over \$12 million for the project.

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
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CLAIR CREEK REHABILITATION

The City of Waterloo is in the process of developing a detailed rehabilitation plan for sections of North Clair Creek between Erbsville Road and the outfall of Clair Lake (see map delineating the five reaches of North Clair Creek).

Clair Creek North - Reaches 1 through 5

A Class Environmental Assessment (EA) for Clair Lake Park and North Clair Creek was completed in 2005. Based upon the original recommendations of the EA as well as updated recommendations specific to Clair Lake (Reach 5), the City has retained Conestoga-Rovers and Associates (CRA) to carry out the detail design for Reach 2 (Erbsville Road to Columbia Street), Reach 3 (Columbia Street to Fischer-Hallman Road), and Reach 5 (Craigleith Drive to outfall of Clair Lake). As part of the design process, the City solicited input early the design process from residents in the immediate area surrounding Reach 2 and 3. Invitations were sent out to residents to participate in a series of "kitchen table" meetings held the week of March 21 to 25, 2011 at the Columbia Street Fire Station. Residents were provided with background information and asked to provide comments on the initial design options being considered, the proposed implementation schedule, and to identify any potential impacts during construction. Information presented at the "kitchen table" meetings along with a summary of the comments received can be viewed on the project website at www.waterloo.ca/ clairlake (see the Public Notices and Events tab). The next step in the design process involves developing more detailed design drawings for Reaches 2 and 3 taking into consideration the feedback received to date. A second Public Information Centre (PIC) meeting, open to all interested parties will be held in the fall of 2011 to solicit feedback on the detail design drawings for Reaches 2 and 3. Opinion: Clair Creek Rehab is Destructive

If you have read about Clair Creek Rehabilitation project, you might think this is a fairly benign process of cleaning up garbage in the creek. Wrong!

As I discovered at one of the "kitchen table" meetings, this is actually a project to bring in heavy machinery to move the creek and walking path and to completely landscape the valley.

The "reach 2" area most affected is the area of the trail between Honeywood Place and Chancery Lane. Hopefully you take the time to enjoy this calm trail from time to time. A wide variety of animals and birds inhabit the diverse meadows and dense shrub cover.

In the current plan a significant portion of the low-land meadow of reach 2 will be graded, perhaps removing a foot of topsoil along with all vegetation with the exception of perhaps a couple of "significant" trees (they may die anyhow). Bulldozers and excavators will be used to move the creek and to grade the meadow lands around the creek. The walking path will be moved to run right behind the houses of Chancery Lane, and the creek will go approximately down the middle of the valley.

In my opinion, this is a case of planning gone nuts. It is an attempt to modify the creek bed to suit some ideal of how a creek should be, in order to make it run more slowly and flood more often.

I would like to see any "rehabilitation" limited to obstructing flow in the current creek location. That land has naturalized over the past 20 years; I do not want to see this start from scratch. My kids are under 10, but they'll have left home before the valley returns to its current state.

Others have expressed concerns about cost, loss of privacy due to the trail being closer to homes, increased mosquitoes due to more flooding and reduced property value.

If you feel as I do, please let the project manager know. In any case, if you care about this small wild space, please attend the information meetings.

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


